WHO REMEMBERS THE ABORTED CHILDREN

In 1999, I was deeply moved by the Memorial Day concert shown on TV from Washington D.C. honoring the men and women who fought and died for their country so we could all be free. They fought for all of us - the elderly, the middle aged, the young and all the babies. Yes. I am proud of my country but I'm ashamed of the law that allows the killing of babies in the womb of their mothers and the laws that forbids mentioning God in public schools and buildings.

Charles Durning, an American Movie Star, gave an impassioned speech and his moving words could well be applied to the aborted babies of our country. "We grieve for each and everyone. You are precious in our eyes.

We wonder what great heights you could have achieved had your life not been taken." I couldn't help but wonder if some day we might hold a national memorial for the over 62 million babies killed, not by an enemy from a distant land, but by our own laws and by their own mothers.

SAFE ENVIRONMENT PROGRAM - ADULT TRAINING (VIRTUS) Effective Immediately In light of the current health conditions, one prudent and preventative measure we are taking is to make the VIRTUS Protecting God's Children for Adults training available Online as an option. Effective immediately, due to COVID-19, the Archdiocesan requirement for attending a VIRTUS Protecting God's Children for Adults workshop live session will be suspended and the option of the online version of the module can be offered in lieu of live training. This is a temporary safety precaution, and parishes may still offer the live training session available as an option if they prefer as long as the local county and state ordinances in effect at the time of the event are followed. Please note, the training must still be completed prior to participants working around youth, but the requirement may now temporarily be met by completing the online Protecting God's Children module. Individuals needing to attend a session will be offered the option of the online module at the time of registration. They will still need to follow the background screening and policy completion process at the time of registration. Individuals who are already currently registered for an upcoming live session, may log back into their account and change to the online module. These procedures will be reviewed and updated periodically as needed and are in place to protect you, those you work with, and your family. 19th Sunday in ordinary Time, Year A (8/9/2020)

Texts:

First Reading, 1 Kings, 19:11-13

Second Reading. Romans 9:1-5

Third Reading. Matt. 14:22-33

Theme: He Can Help Others, but Will He Help Me?

Congregation: St. Joseph-St. Lawrence Catholic Church, Easton/ Kansas

Dear brothers and sisters,

Warm greetings once again. I am sure you are all still staying safe and well. Today the Lord invites us again to his banquet table on this 19th Sunday in the ordinary Time. The question he invites us to ask ourselves is: He can help others, but will he help me?

Do you believe everything you read? There was a time that we would pick up a newspaper and be confident that what we were reading was actually the facts and didn't slant one way or other. There was a time we could pick up a biography and not worry whether it was the official or unofficial telling of the person's life. There was a time that we could trust what we read.

But today, we read with more skepticism. We are skeptical when we read the email that says we millionaires. We are skeptical when the internet headline says that there is an amazing medical breakthrough. We are skeptical that the newspaper is actually providing an accurate account of the facts.

We have this skepticism because there have been many times when these outlets have proven less than trustworthy. We have believed them one time too many. Maybe we have believed something only to have people laugh at us because the know it is a hoax. Maybe we have clicked on those headlines only to find it is not as big of a breakthrough as they said. Maybe we read the newspaper and found out later that the story was not nearly as accurate or truthful as it claims to be.

As we look at our sermon text this morning, we see more than just skepticism, we see doubt. We see Jesus allowing Peter to do something that on one else has ever done, but even in the midst of that amazing miracle Peter still doubts the power of his Savior. The question in Peter's mind was the same one in the hearts the disciples who faced the storm, it's the same question of doubt and fear that is often in our hearts and minds, "He can help others, but will he help me?"

Imagine you are one of the disciples. Every single day you see Jesus healing the sick, driving out demons, and doing other miracles. Can you imagine yourself starting to take those for granted? Can you imagine that you are not as amazed at the miracles of Jesus as you were at first?

In the Bible, we see Jesus doing many, many miracles that benefitted other people, but we don't often see him doing miracle that directly benefitted his disciples. For instance, Jesus healed many other people, but we are only given one instance where he healed a relative of a disciple. Jesus fed the 4000 and the 5000, but he did not miraculously bring food to his disciples every day. They had fish for meals

and pay for food just as everyone else did. Jesus raised other people from the dead, but he did not raise a disciple from the dead.

It seems as if Jesus was always doing his miracles for someone else and not his disciples. It would have been easy for them to think that Jesus did miracles for other people, but not for them. There are two instances where Jesus performed miracles that directly benefitted his disciples. The Bible gives us two accounts of storms on the Sea of Galilee that Jesus' disciples were trapped in.

The first time, Jesus and his disciples were on a boat travelling across the Sea of Galilee when a storm came up. The disciples battled the storm with all they could muster, while Jesus slept. Finally, when they could not think of anything else to do, they ran to Jesus, woke him and asked him to save them. Jesus calmed the storm, but asked them, "Where is your faith?"

The second time is our sermon text for today. Jesus has sent his disciples on ahead of him to the other side of the Sea of Galilee. This time, Jesus did not go with them because he wanted some time alone to pray to his Father.

It wasn't long before a storm came upon the lake. It was a ferocious storm. They couldn't turn back because the waves were so big and they couldn't move forward because the wind was against them. They had battled the storm for hours. They were wet afraid and tired when towards morning they see something that they have never seen before. Someone walking to them on the water. They are afraid and think that it is a mirage or worse a ghost or demon.

Jesus calls out to calm them, "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid" Even though they know this voice, they still doubted. Peter calls out, "If is you tell me to come to you on the water".

What happens? Jesus allows a great miracle to occur. Peter steps out of the boat onto the water and he begins to walk on that water. But even in the middle of Jesus' amazing power, doubt still comes. As Peter takes his eyes off of Jesus, he sees the wind and the waves and he doubts that Jesus power can sustain him through the storm. This doubt gets in the way of Peter's faith and he begins to sink into the water. He calls out, "Lord save me".

Do you see the irony of Peter calling out, "Lord save me!? There should have been no reason for him to be saved. He had been walking on water, safe in the power of Jesus, but his own doubts and fears and lack of faith got in the way of trusting that power of Jesus. It was his own doubts and fears that led him to be sinking and needing to be saved.

The Bible is filled with many amazing lessons that show us God's power in saving his faithful people. From the Old Testament lessons to the miracles of Jesus, God teaches us the amazing truth that we're safe in his power. These accounts that are written in the Bible are not just stories like a children's book which is read at story time or at bedtime. They are faith-building accounts of our God's grace, love, discipline and deliverance. They are true and deserve our highest honor and respect.

But sometimes, we treat them as just stories. We treat them with the same doubt, the same skepticism we read our newspaper with. Maybe we doubt that what God actually said happened, happened. We look for more logical solution. Or maybe we question the truth that God is trying to teach us, that he actually does care about us, watch over and save us. We are awed by what has done in these

stories of other people. But part of us doubts that they actually happened and part of us doubts that he would do this for us.

We never apply these lessons to ourselves personally. We have a hard time realizing and believing that the same God who delivered the Israelites form The Egyptians. The same God who allowed Peter to walk on water and calmed the storm, is the same God who promises that his power and mercy is also watching over us.

We may take these Bible lessons and be skeptical that what happened, happened. We think that God is saving someone else, but not us, but we shouldn't. Those doubts are sins against God. The First commandment tells us we should fear, love and trust in him above all things and when we don't do that we are not following him as we should.

Because of our lack of faith, we miss the small miracles that God provides every day. We miss the moments of peace and joy that we have. Instead, we dwell on the bad parts of the day. We miss the blessing of movement and life. Instead we focus on the pain and illnesses we have. We miss the blessing of work. Instead we focus on the low pay, or poor boss, or bad working conditions. We miss the blessing of a mind that is powerful, instead we dwell on the things we don't know and understand.

All these doubts get in the way of seeing our God and Savior really is. We miss the wonderful things that he gives us every day. While he watches over us now and takes care of us, he has also taken care of our future. By his own suffering and death, he has given us a future with him in heaven where there will be no storms, no reason to doubt and fear. He has given us a future we don't deserve. A future in the glory of heaven.

In His Word, God certainly shows how he has helped other people, but he is also showing us how he can help us. In the middle of the storm, Jesus came to the disciples, he didn't leave them alone. When Peter was drowning, he didn't let him flounder for a while, he lifted Peter up, and calmed the storm and all was well.

Jesus may not always stop every storm from coming into our life, but we can be sure that as we live with that storm that he will do the same thing for us that he has done in his Word countless times. He will be with us during that storm and struggle, he will lift us up during that storm, he will calm our storm in his way and in his time. In the end all will be well. The Lord therefore says to us today, "Call me if you need anything".
