CALL TO SHARE: What images come to mind when you hear the word An American flag flying high as fighter jets streak across the sky? Confetti falling on the winning team as they hoist another trophy? Or perhaps a celebrity all decked out as they accept an award? These are all pretty reasonable representations of glory, on a human level. So when Jesus speaks about glorifying the Father, we might expect him to paint a similar kind of picture: one of power, grandeur, and awe. Instead, the clearest image Christ gives us in today's Gospel is of a grain of wheat falling to the ground and dying. Hm. Not exactly what most of us have in mind when we think "glorious.

In typical fashion, though, Jesus is showing us that the ways of God are not the ways of men. While God's glory does include His power and awesomeness and majesty and might, it also includes something else that we might find a little surprising: the giving of Himself for another, so that they might have life. This is why Christ's Self-Gift on the Cross—perhaps even more so then the Resurrection or the Ascension-is highlighted in John's Gospel as the place of His Glory. And it's why the Cross has been called Christ's Royal Throne throughout Christian history.

We are called to glorify God, too. And we can't do better than by imitating Jesus, offering generous, fruitful sacrifices in union with Christ. This Lenten season is the perfect time to do so. We can take part in many opportunities for almsgiving. We can also contribute to our Archbishop's Call to Share appeal, allowing a grain of our wealth to bear much fruit in our parish community. As we go forward this week, let's ask God to show us how we can glorify His name by giving generously in imitation of Christ.

rhetoric which surrounds the issue.

- * "The government should not interfere with someone's personal choice." This is neither practical" desirable or correct. If there is only one legitimate function of government, it is the protection of innocent human life and to prevent one individual victimizing another. The word "choice" might sound good, but the reality is that some "choices" are crimes and all crimes are "choices".
- Abortion advocates try to use smokescreen language to conceal the truth about abortion. A good example is the term "women's reproductive rights". The biological reality is that when a woman is pregnant, reproduction has already occurred. If that were not true, there would be nothing for the abortionist to abort.
- * Another deliberately misleading term is "woman's access to healthcare". Healthcare relates to the treatment of diseases, injuries or illnesses. Since pregnancy is none of these, abortion is definitely not "healthcare".

- Increase in tax deduction for cash gifts: For donors that itemize their tax return, before the new legislation, the annual income limit was capped at 60% for cash gifts. The new legislation allows for charitable donations up to 100% of a donor's annual income.



5th Sunday of Lent, Year B, (3/21/2012).

Texts:

First Reading. Jer. 31:31-34

Second. Reading. Heb.5:20-30.

Third Reading. Jn. 12: 20-30.

Theme: Christ Is Ready To Offer Everything For Our Salvation.

Congregation: St. Joseph of the Valley-St. Lawrence Parish, Easton/ Kansas.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Today as we celebrate the 5th of Sunday of Lent, we are drawing close to our destination and to the most important moments in our journey this season. This fact is reflected in all the reading of this Sunday. Christ is reading to offer everything for our salvation. So, we too must be willing all for him and for others.

The first reading of this Sunday is an assurance of god's presence with us. It also reminds us of the new thing that God is about to do in our midst: I will make a new covenant and never call their sin to mind...then, I will be their God and they will be my people." God is ready to set aside a relationship that was destroyed by infidelity. He wishes to restore a broken relationship.

On our part we must be ready to accept this new covenant with God. This new covenant offers us salvation and life. So, as we continue our walk this Lent, let us know that God is willing to fulfill his promise and nothing can stop him. All he demands from us is to be ready to accept this new covenant made in Jesus Christ.

The second reading of this Sunday reminds us of the Gethsemane experience of Jesus. It reminds of the great sacrifice of Christ. First, this was in order to fulfill the promise of his father. Second, it was in order to save us." He learnt to obey through suffering...he became for all who obey him the source of eternal life."

Christ is willing to pay this price this season in order to get us going in life. He will achieve it through his prayer and suffering for humanity. He will do all these in humility and obedience, which are very important virtues we need in order excel

in life. Without these Christ would not be able to achieve the new covenant for our salvation.

Today as we see Christ carrying out his priestly and intercessory role, we must find new courage to press on in the midst of trials, persecution, and even doubts. Also, we must learn from His experience, that suffering is necessary, and inevitable in life. This is because, just as Christ, we will be made perfect through it.

The gospel of this Sunday draws us to our destination. Christ himself tells us: "Now the hour has come for the son of man to be glorified." What glory is there in suffering? He is about to be arrested, punished. and killed, yet he talks about his glory. Jesus saw beyond the clouds of pains and difficulties in order to behold success and eternal life.

He knew that his suffering and death would restore life to many. So, rather than to be discouraged by the temporary situation of suffering, he was encouraged and motivated by the honest reward of eternal life. Hence, Christ offered his suffering and life in order to restore a broken covenant and eternal life for all who believe in him. Hence, He says: "Unless a grain of wheat dies it remains a single grain, but if it dies it yields a rich harvest".

Unfortunately, many of us do not want to follow or like this path. Jesus invites us to be strong along the path of life. He wants us to be where he is. So, we must be ready to endure as he did. We must be ready to die as a grain dies in order to regenerate. Practically speaking, we die every day when we stand up for justice, when we stand for the truth and when we say no to sin, corruption and immorality.

These "daily deaths" exhaust us physically, but they strengthen us spiritually. Therefore, as we continue our walk with Christ this season, the thought of his own suffering and death must strengthen us daily. Also, we must constantly remind ourselves that to suffer for others and for Christ is an honorable thing to do.
